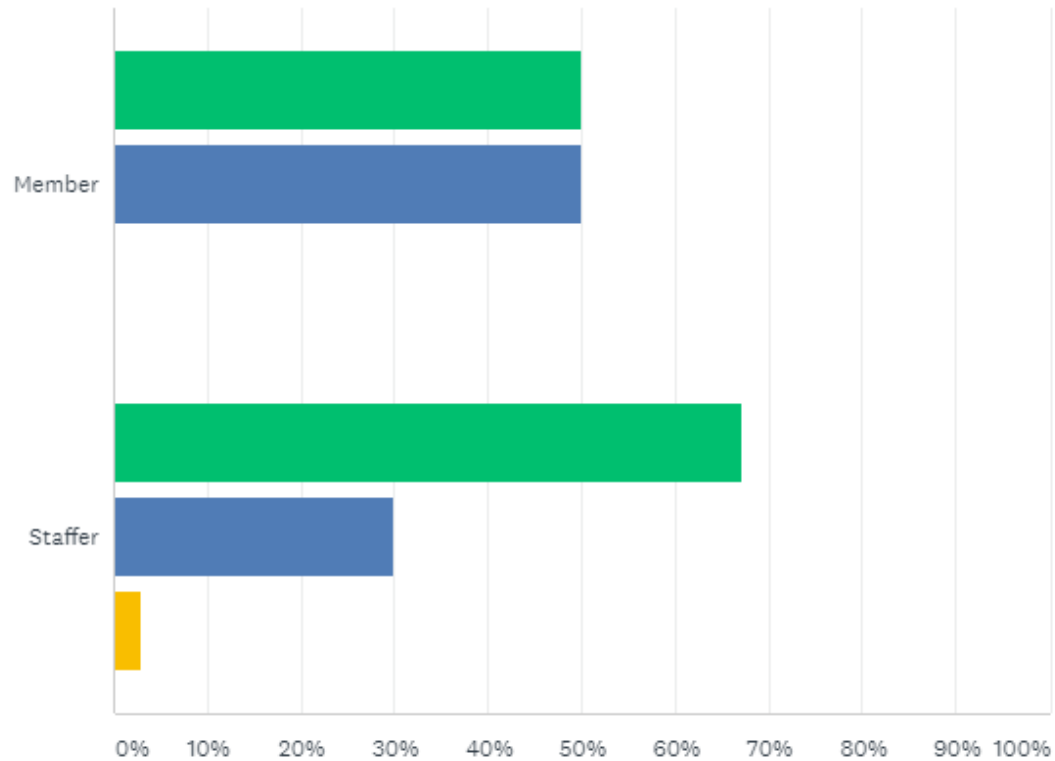

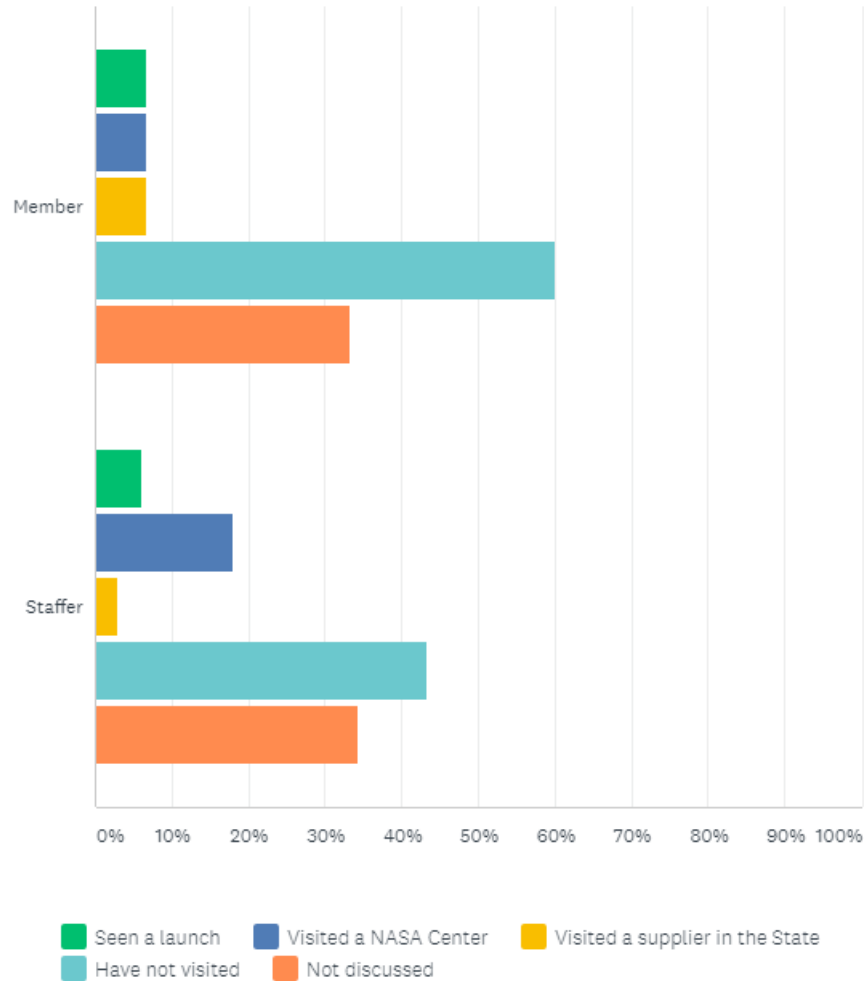
- 6 of 10 new Senators and 67 of 101 new Reps.

How engaged were they during the discussion?



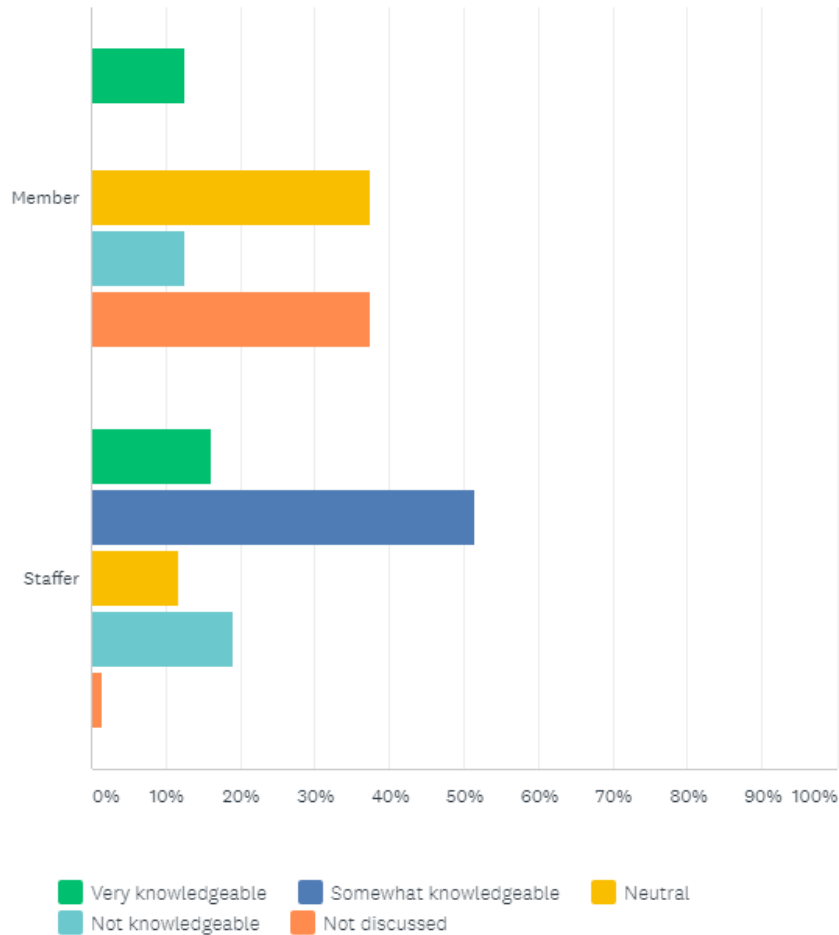
■ Highly engaged (Asking specific questions, taking notes, etc.)

Have They Ever...?



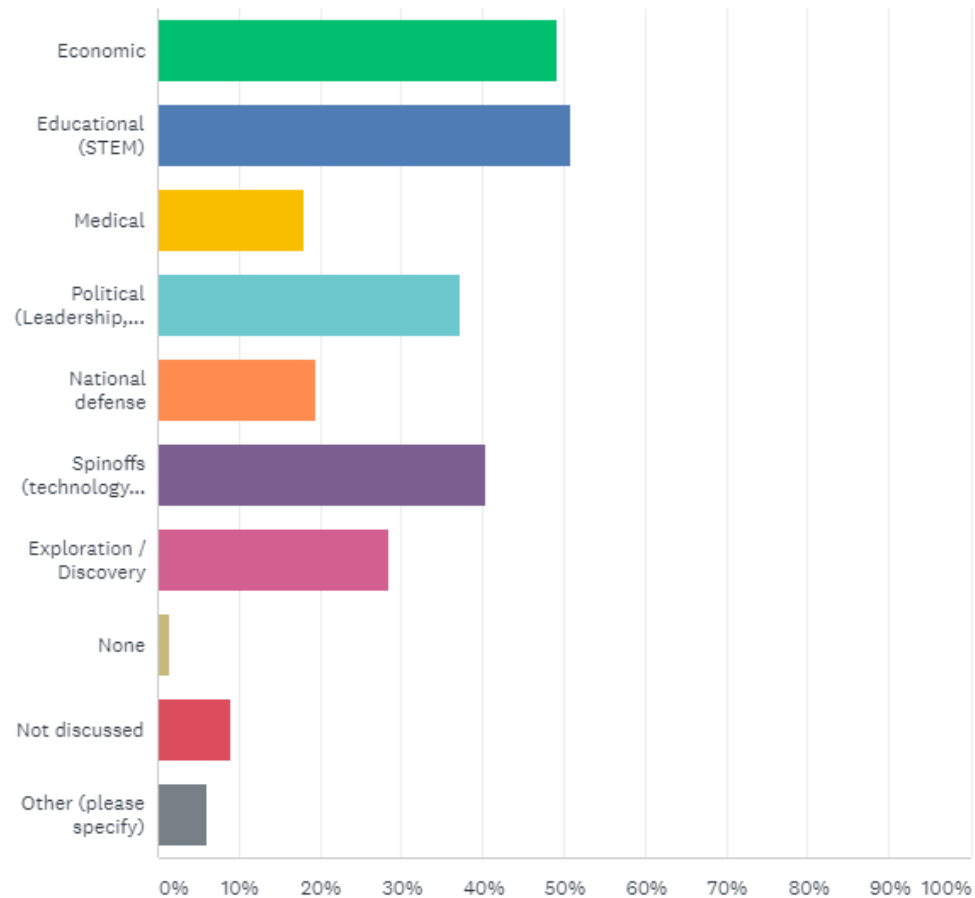


How aware was the office of NASA's human spaceflight programs



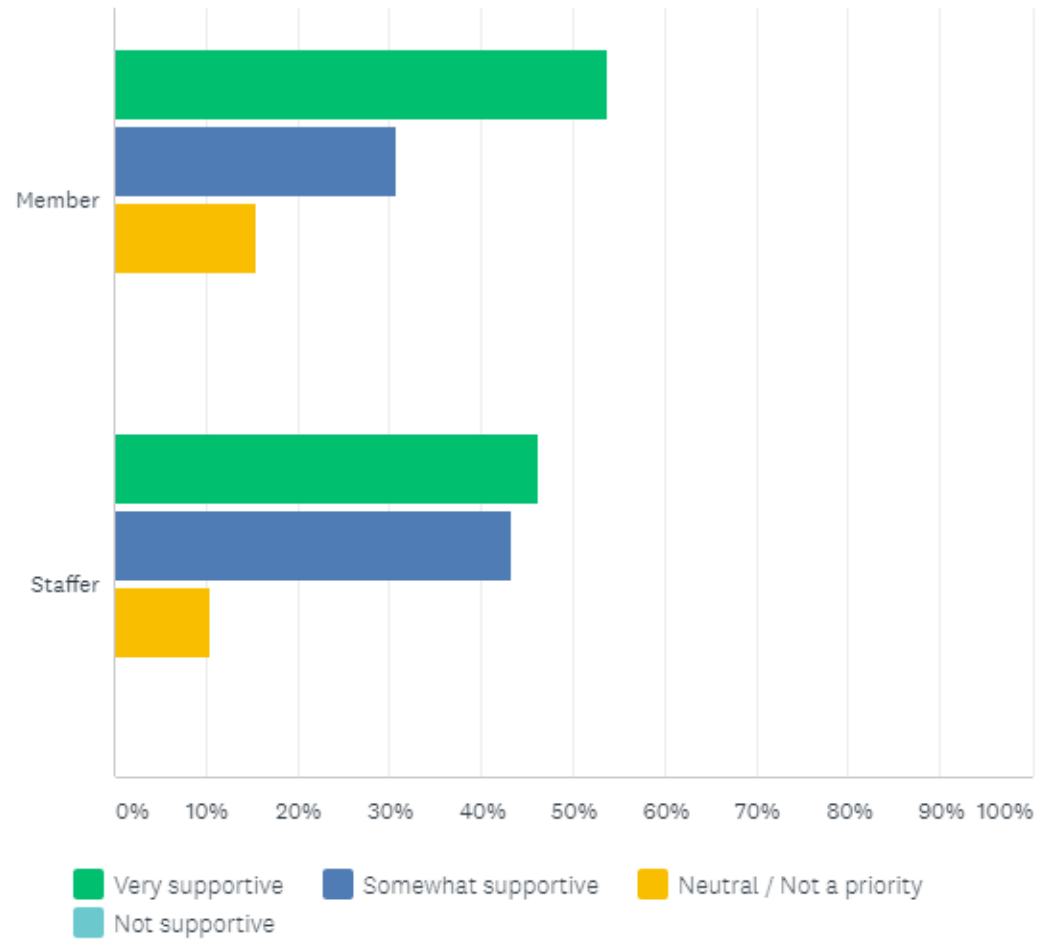


Did they mention any specific benefits? Or were there any that resonated particularly well?



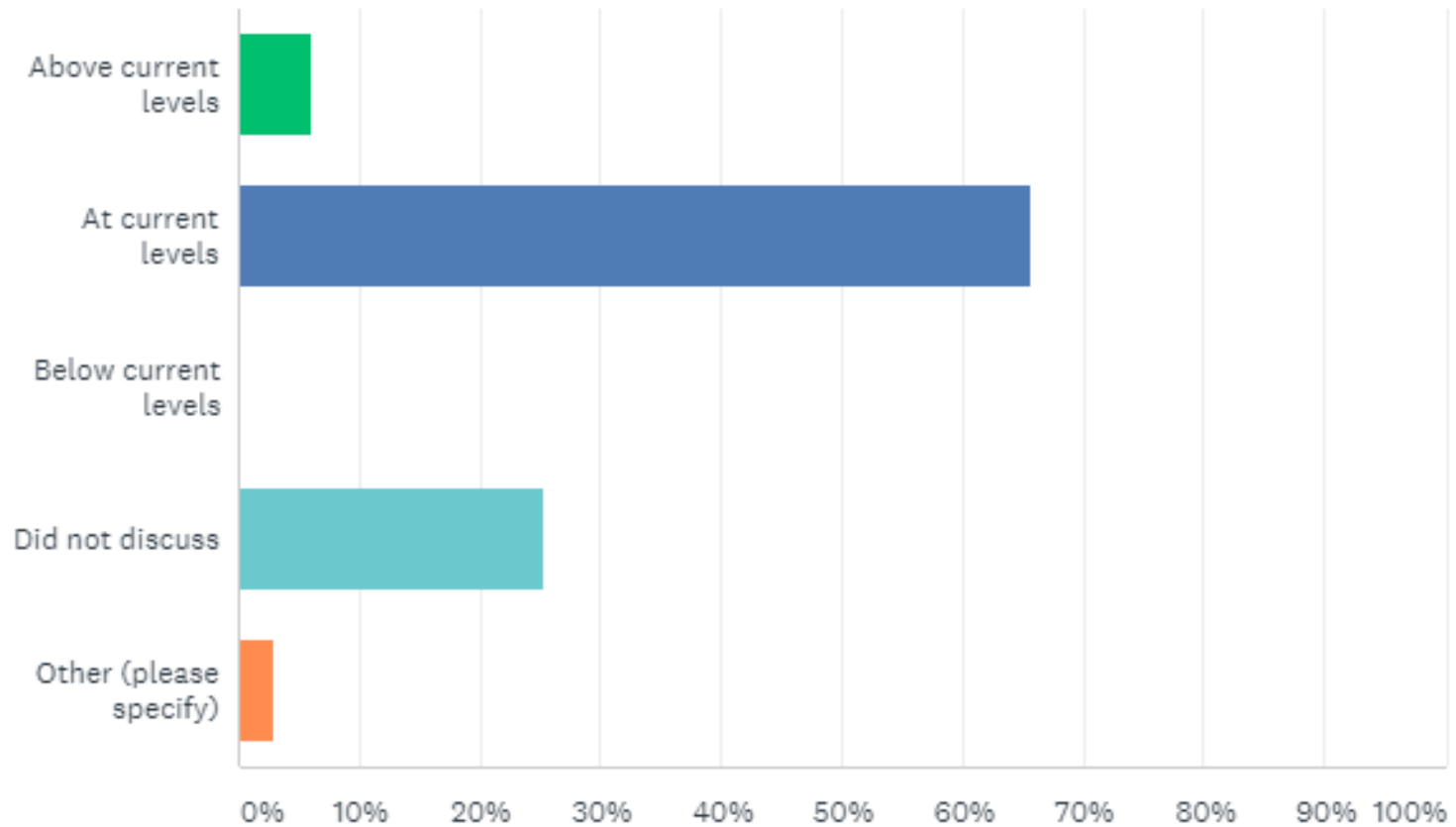


What is their level of support for Human Space Exploration?

Conclusion



- Trip went very well
 - 73 of 111 freshmen members
- Freshmen offices seemed more familiar with or were excited to learn more about Human Spaceflight
 - Congressional Staff were taking more notes and asking more questions than two years ago.
 - Staff had less direct experience with the space program (visits to centers, seeing a launch etc.)
 - May be an opportunity to engage more offices and work with the Coalition to recruit staffers into their certification classes
- Going in conjunction with SLS/Orion Suppliers conference works out well
 - Suppliers Conference focused on committee chairs & other targets
 - CSE was able to focus on maximizing Freshmen contact
 - Saved schedules and budget
 - There was some overlap between the two visits
 - Offices received messages multiple times that week
